THEOPHANY: CELEBRATING THE BLESSING OF THE WATERS



On January 6th, Greece and Cyprus celebrate Theophany, also known as the Feast of the Epiphany or Ta Fota. This important Christian holiday marks the baptism of Jesus Christ in the Jordan River and symbolises spiritual enlightenment.

One of the most striking traditions of Theophany is the Blessing of the Waters. In coastal towns, lakes, and rivers, priests throw a cross into the water, and brave swimmers dive in to retrieve it. The one who finds the cross is said to receive a special blessing for the year ahead. This ritual signifies the purification of both people and nature.

Another tradition is the Great Blessing of the Waters in homes and churches, where holy water is sprinkled to bring protection and renewal. The day also marks the end of the Christmas celebrations.

Theophany is a deeply spiritual and cultural event, bringing communities together to honour faith, renewal, and the power of light over darkness.



On Epiphany, the priest of our church, the Church of Holy Trinity and Saint Luke, threw the cross in the Brookvale Park Lake, right next to our school. Parents and students from our school attended and watched the ritual.







Three Holy Hierarchs


The Feast of the Three Hierarchs, celebrated on January 30th, honors three great saints of the Eastern Orthodox Church: Saint Basil the Great, Saint Gregory the Theologian, and Saint John Chrysostom. These revered figures, known as the "Three Holy Hierarchs," are celebrated for their profound contributions to Christian theology, their commitment to education, and their charitable works.

Saint Basil the Great was renowned for his care for the poor and his extensive writings that shaped Christian monasticism. Saint Gregory the Theologian is celebrated for his theological insights and oratory skills, particularly in defending the doctrine of the Holy Trinity. Saint John Chrysostom, known for his eloquent sermons, emphasized the importance of moral living and social justice.

The Feast of the Three Hierarchs is not only a religious celebration but also a significant cultural event in Greece, particularly for educators and students. Schools often commemorate the day with special services, speeches, and educational activities to highlight the importance of learning and ethical living, inspired by the lives of these three saints.



John Chrysostom was born in Antioch, Syria. He studied Theology, Philosophy, and Rhetoric. He spoke on issues relevant to his time, and his speeches were so excellent that he was called "Chrysostom" (Golden-mouthed). He organized meals for thousands of poor people but also made many enemies as he criticized the mistakes of the rulers. He was exiled and died from hardships. Today, he is considered a saint by both the Orthodox and Catholic Churches.



Gregory of Nazianzus was born in Arianzus, near Nazianzus in Cappadocia, to landowning parents. He studied Philosophy, Rhetoric, Law, and Philology in Athens. Besides being a theologian, he was also a poet. He wrote poems with theological and moral teachings. He renounced his wealth, became a priest, and later Patriarch in Constantinople. However, he quickly left the patriarchal throne and returned to his small province.



Βασίλειος ο Μέγας (330 - 479μ.Χ.)

Basil the Great was born in Neocaesarea in Pontus to noble, Orthodox, and educated parents. He studied in Constantinople and Athens, covering subjects like geometry, philosophy, astronomy, rhetoric, medicine, and grammar. He donated a large part of his personal fortune to the poor and the church. He always helped the poor, the hungry, and the sick, regardless of race, religion, or origin. His life's work includes founding the Basiliad from his wealth—a complex for caring for strangers, providing medical care to the poor and sick, and offering vocational training to the unskilled.






